THE LECTURE/LUNCH on SATURDAY 16 NOVEMBER



This was given by Capt Chris Page RN. Chris served for 37 years in the RN, 11 of which were as Head of the Naval Historical Branch. He gave detailed account of Hitler's invasion plan, 'Operation Sea Lion. This was to be an amphibious offensive on the south coast of England from North Foreland to Weymouth. It was pretty clear from the outset that it would be an unmitigated failure. As a logistics exercise it was doomed to disaster. Consider the following:

Operation Sea Lion called for more than 250,000 German troops, 60,000 horses, and nearly 35,000 vehicles to embark from ports in occupied France and Belgium and land in three waves on a 200-mile front. Moreover, suitable landing craft simply did not exist. Over 2,000 Rhine River barges, tugs, and other vessels were assembled for the operation and most of these had to be modified with steel and concrete reinforcement and landing ramps. It was envisaged that the Rhine barges would be towed line astern, each carrying 500 men. Capt Page

pointed out that one destroyer travelling at 30 knots could swamp and sink the three at a stroke. Furthermore, at this period during the war the Luftwaffe was virtually non-existent. The whole operation was not helped by the major disagreements between Gross Admiral Raeder and Gross Admiral Doenitz. But perhaps the final humiliation would be a confrontation with Captain Mainwaring!! This was, by far, the best attended lecture of the year.
